

CANEX ENERGY CORP.
MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED APRIL 30, 2018

1.1 DATE

The following Management Discussion and Analysis (“MD&A”) is prepared by management and approved by the Board of Directors as at August 14, 2018 and should be read in conjunction with the audited financial statements for the year ended April 30, 2018 of Canex Energy Corp (“Canex” or the “Company”) with the related notes thereto. Those financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (“IFRS”).

Readers may also want to refer to the April 30, 2017 audited financial statements and the accompanying notes. All dollar amounts included therein and in the following MD&A are expressed in Canadian dollars except where noted. Further information regarding the Company and its operations are filed electronically on the System for Electronic Document Analysis and Retrieval (SEDAR) in Canada and can be obtained from www.sedar.com.

1.3 OVERALL PERFORMANCE

The Company was incorporated on September 20, 2006 under the *Business Corporations Act* (British Columbia) to operate as a resource exploration and development company focusing on the acquisition and exploration of mineral properties.

On September 13, 2016, the Company common shares were consolidated on a basis of one post-consolidated common share for every three pre-consolidated common shares. On March 31, 2017, the Company common shares were consolidated on a basis of one post-consolidated common share for every five pre-consolidated common shares. The numbers of the shares presented in these financial statements have all been adjusted to reflect the impact of these share consolidations. On June 20, 2017, the Company announced that it has entered into a non-binding letter of intent (the “LOI”) with Quintet Ventures Inc. (“Quintet”) in respect of a proposed transaction pursuant to which a wholly-owned subsidiary of Quintet is expected to acquire Canex by way of reverse takeover for a combination of cash and share consideration. On February 7, 2018, the Company terminated the LOI with Quintet.

As of February 9, 2018, the Company is listed on NEX Board and is currently seeking new business opportunities. The trading symbol of the Company is CSC.H. The NEX Board is a separate board of the TSX Venture Exchange for companies previously listed on the TSX Venture Exchange.

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Private Placement and Share Repricing

During the year ended April 30, 2018:

- i) There was no share issuance activity during this period.

- ii) There was no share issuance activity during this period.
- iii) An agreement was reached with the Company's former CEO ("Subscriber") in regards to the pricing of a previously completed private placement financing approved by the TSX Venture Exchange (the "Exchange") pursuant to a bulletin issued on March 16, 2016.

The Subscriber initially purchased 284,000 pre-consolidation shares at \$0.125 per share (94,667 shares at \$0.375 per share post 1 for 3 rollback). As a result of a review completed by the Exchange, an agreement has been reached such that the price of the shares purchased by the Subscriber has been adjusted from at \$0.125 per share to \$0.25 per share (\$0.375 to \$0.75 per share post 1 for 3 rollback), resulting in the issuance of 47,333 shares to the Subscriber under the private placement. The balance of the 47,333 post rollback shares received by the Subscriber under the private placement are deemed to have been received by the Subscriber at a price of \$0.25 per share (\$0.75 per share post rollback) in settlement of debts owing by the Company to the Subscriber. The net effect of this agreement was to increase the price of the 284,000 pre-consolidation shares (94,667 post rollback) acquired by the Subscriber, from \$0.125 per share (\$0.375 post rollback), to \$0.25 per share (\$0.75 post rollback), and to eliminate any amounts owing by the Company to the Subscriber. \$35,500 was added to share capital as a result of this repricing.

1.4 SELECTED ANNUAL INFORMATION

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1.5 RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

For the three months ended April 30, 2018, the Company incurred a net loss of \$159,202 due to incurring higher consulting fees in the current period compared to a loss \$35,455 in the prior comparable period. The increase in consulting fees is a result of new executive positions and roles in place to move the Company forward.

For the year ended April 30, 2018, the Company incurred a net loss of \$502,139 due to granting stock options and incurring higher consulting fees in the current period compared to a loss \$71,298 in the prior comparable period. The increase in consulting fees is a result of new executive positions and roles in place to move the Company forward.

LIQUIDITY AND CAPITAL RESOURCES

The Company had a working capital deficiency of \$637,519 as of April 30, 2018 compared to a working capital deficiency of \$185,635 as of April 30, 2017.

Net cash used in operating activities for the year ended April 30, 2018 was \$10,700 compared to net cash used in operating activities for the year ended April 30, 2017 of \$80,774. The cash used in operating activities for the current year was for general and administrative expenditures, continued business development in areas of sourcing new finances to continue operations. Accrued consulting fees attributed to the lower cash outflow for the current period.

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Net cash provided by financing activities for the year ended April 30, 2018 was \$25,000 compared to \$95,000 for the year ended April 30, 2017.

On August 10, 2017, the Company entered into a \$5,000 promissory note with the Chief Executive Officer (Sherman Dahl) of the Company. The promissory note is interest free, unsecured, and due on demand.

On August 16, 2017, the Company entered into a \$10,000 promissory note with a current director (Ross McElroy) of the Company. The promissory note is interest free, unsecured, and due on demand.

On August 17, 2017, the Company entered into a \$10,000 promissory note with a current director (Craig Schneider) of the Company. The promissory note is interest free, unsecured, and due on demand.

The Company will require financing from external sources, including the issuance of new shares or debt. There can be no assurance that such financing will be available to the Company or, if available, that it will be offered on acceptable terms. If additional financing is raised through the issuance of equity or convertible debt securities, control of the Company may change and the interest of shareholders in the net assets of the Company may be diluted. If unable to secure financing on acceptable terms, the Company may have to cancel or postpone certain of its planned exploration and development activities which may ultimately lead to the Company's inability to fulfill the minimum work obligations under the terms of its option agreements.

1.7 OFF-BALANCE SHEET ARRANGEMENTS

The Company does not utilize off-balance sheet arrangements.

1.8 TRANSACTIONS WITH RELATED PARTIES

The value of transactions and outstanding balances relating to key officers and directors and entities over which they have control or significant influence were as follows:

Amounts and balances incurred from current directors and officers:

The Company incurred \$38,319 (2017 - \$Nil) share based compensation with directors and officers.

The Company incurred \$140,000 (April 30, 2017 - \$30,000) of fees from the Chief Executive Officer of the Company for consulting services performed. As at April 30, 2018, the Company owed \$172,288 (April 30, 2017 - \$30,000) for unpaid fees.

The Company incurred \$140,000 (April 30, 2017 - \$20,000) of fees from a private company controlled by the Chief Financial Officer of the Company for consulting services performed. As at April 30, 2018, the Company owed \$146,500 (April 30, 2017 - \$5,000) for unpaid fees.

The Company incurred \$42,000 (April 30, 2017 - \$10,000) of fees from a Director of the Company for consulting services performed. As at April 30, 2018, the Company owed \$52,000 (April 30, 2017 - \$10,000) for unpaid fees.

The Company incurred \$42,000 (April 30, 2017 - \$NIL) of fees from a Director of the Company for consulting services performed. As at April 30, 2018, the Company owed \$42,000 (April 30, 2017 - \$NIL) for unpaid fees.

The Company incurred \$33,000 (April 30, 2017 - \$NIL) of fees from a Director of the Company for consulting services performed. As at April 30, 2018 the Company owed \$33,000 (April 30, 2017 - \$NIL) for unpaid fees.

1.10 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGMENTS AND CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

Significant accounting judgments

Significant accounting judgments that management has made in the process of applying accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements include, but are not limited to, the ability of the Company to continue as a going concern.

Critical accounting estimates

Key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next financial year include, but are not limited to, the following:

- i) *Deferred income taxes* - The Company is periodically required to estimate the tax basis of assets and liabilities. Where applicable tax laws and regulations are either unclear or subject to varying interpretations, it is possible that changes in these estimates could occur that materially affect the amounts of deferred income tax assets and liabilities recorded in the financial statements. Changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities generally have a direct impact on earnings in the period that the changes occur. Each period, the Company evaluates the likelihood of whether some portion or all of each deferred tax asset will not be realized. This evaluation is based on historic and future expected levels of taxable income, the pattern and timing of reversals of taxable temporary timing differences that give rise to deferred tax liabilities, and tax planning initiatives.

1.11 NEW ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND AMENDMENTS TO EXISTING STANDARDS

New accounting standards and recent pronouncements

The Company has not applied the following new or revised standards and amendments that have been issued but are not yet effective for the Company’s April 30, 2018 reporting period:

- New standard IFRS 9, *Financial Instruments*, Classification and Measurement is the first part of a new standard on classification and measurement of financial assets that will replace IAS 39, “*Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement*.” IFRS 9 has two measurement categories: amortized cost and fair value. All equity instruments are measured at fair value. A debt instrument is at amortized cost only if the entity is holding it to collect contractual cash flows and the cash flows represent principal and interest. Otherwise it is at fair value through profit and loss. The standard is effective for annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2018.
- IFRS 16 *Leases* specifies how an IFRS reporter will recognize, measure, present and disclose leases. The standard provides a single lessee accounting model, requiring lessees to recognize assets and liabilities for all leases unless the lease term is 12 months or less or the underlying asset has a low value. Lessors continue to classify leases as operating or finance, with IFRS 16’s approach to lessor accounting substantially unchanged from its predecessor, IAS 17. This standard is effective for reporting periods beginning on or after January 1, 2019.

The Company is currently evaluating the impact the new accounting standard is expected to have on its financial statements.

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1.12 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Fair value

Fair value estimates of financial instruments are made at a specific point in time, based on relevant information about financial markets and specific financial instruments. As these estimates are subjective in nature, involving uncertainties and matters of significant judgment, they cannot be determined with precision. Changes in assumptions can significantly affect estimated fair values.

The carrying values of cash and accounts payable and accrued liabilities approximate their fair value because of the short-term nature of these instruments.

Financial risk factors

The Company's risk exposures and the impact on the Company's financial statements are summarized below:

Credit risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Company to a significant concentration of credit risk consist primarily of cash. The Company limits its exposure to credit loss by placing its cash with major financial institutions.

Liquidity risk

The Company's approach to managing liquidity risk is to ensure that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet liabilities when due. As at April 30, 2018, the Company had a cash balance of \$63,545 (April 30, 2017 - \$14,245) to settle current liabilities of \$701,203 (April 30, 2017- \$203,929). All of the Company's financial liabilities have contractual maturities of 30 days or due on demand and are subject to normal trade terms. The Company will need to raise money through debt or equity issuances.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk of loss that may arise from changes in market factors such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates and commodity and equity prices. Such fluctuations may be significant.

a) Interest rate risk

The Company is exposed to interest rate risk to the extent that the cash maintained at financial institutions is subject to a floating rate of interest. The interest rate risks on cash and on the Company's obligations are not considered significant.

b) Foreign currency risk

The Company is exposed to foreign currency risk on fluctuations related to cash, receivables and accounts payable and accrued liabilities that are denominated in a foreign currency. As at April 30, 2018 the Company did not have any accounts in foreign currencies and considers foreign currency risk insignificant.

c) Price risk

The Company has limited exposure to price risk with respect to commodity and equity prices. Equity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on the Company's earnings due to movements in individual equity prices or general movements in the level of the stock market. Commodity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on earnings and economic value due to commodity price movements and volatilities.

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Capital Management

The Company's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the entity's ability to continue as a going concern. In the management of capital, the Company monitors its adjusted capital which comprises all components of equity (i.e. capital stock, reserves and deficit).

The Company sets the amount of capital in proportion to risk. The Company manages the capital structure and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Company may issue common shares through private placements. The Company is not exposed to any externally imposed capital requirements. The Company's overall strategy remains unchanged from prior year.

1.14 MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Company's management is responsible for presentation and preparation of the financial statements and the Management's Discussion and Analysis ("MD&A"). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

The MD&A has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of securities regulators, including National Instrument 51-102 of the Canadian Securities Administrators.

The financial statements and information in the MD&A necessarily include amounts based on informed judgments and estimates of the expected effects of current events and transactions with appropriate consideration to materiality. In addition, in preparing the financial information the Company's management must interpret the requirements described above, make determinations as to the relevancy of information to be included, and make estimates and assumptions that affect reported information.

The MD&A also includes information regarding the impact of current transactions and events, sources of liquidity and capital resources, operating trends, risks and uncertainties. Actual results in the future may differ materially from our present assessment of this information because future events and circumstances may not occur as expected.
