MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

TO OUR SHAREHOLDERS:

This Management's Discussion and Analysis ("MD&A") supplements, but does not form part of, the condensed consolidated interim financial statements of Goldhills Holding Ltd. ("Goldhills" or the "Company") and the notes thereto for the three months ended October 31, 2025. Consequently, the following discussion and analysis of the financial condition and results of operations for the Company should be read in conjunction with the condensed consolidated interim financial statements for the three months ended October 31, 2025, and the audited consolidated financial statements for the year ended July 31, 2025 which have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS"), consistently applied.

Discussion of the Company, its operations and associated risks is further described in the Company's filings, available for viewing at www.sedarplus.com. A copy of this MD&A will be provided to any applicant upon request.

General

The Company was incorporated in the Province of British Columbia on December 20, 1996. The Company's Registered and Records Office is at 400 - 837 West Hastings, Vancouver, British Columbia, V6C 3N6.

Highlights, significant events and transactions

During the year ended 2023, 18,142,838 common shares issued to acquire Sun & Sand Mining & Metals Guinea SA ("Sun & Sand") have been returned to treasury for cancellation. The shares were returned to treasury as the Company did not have full access to the Siguiro Gold Property and the renewal of the license was affected by the lack of access. The Company may seek to re-issue those cancelled common shares upon resolution of its license status and confirmation that the Company will have the necessary access to the Siguiro Gold Property. Alternatively, the Company may seek the return of the balance of shares for cancellation in exchange for surrendering its ownership of Sun & Sand. Either course of action would be subject to necessary corporate and regulatory approvals including TSX-V approval. The Company also announced the appointment of Dr. Steven Sangha to the Board of Directors.

On January 4, 2023, the Company noted the resignation of Andrew Lee Smith from the Board of Directors of the Company effective December 31, 2022. The Company thanks Mr. Smith for his service to the Company.

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On May 2, 2024, the Company entered a mineral property option agreement with the optionors, Donald MacIntyre and Victor Parsons ("the Optionors"). This agreement grants the Company the option to acquire a 100% interest in the Lennac Lake property, comprising three contiguous mineral claims located in the Omineca mining division of British Columbia. In order to exercise the option, the Company must make cash payments of \$100,000 to the optionors over a three-year period. The payments are scheduled as follows: \$10,000 upon signing (paid), \$20,000 by the first anniversary (paid), \$30,000 by the second anniversary and \$40,000 by the third anniversary of the agreement.

The Company is also obligated to incur exploration expenditures totaling at least \$370,000 by specific milestones: \$75,000 by the first anniversary, an additional \$100,000 by the second anniversary and an additional \$200,000 by the third anniversary. Upon commencement of commercial production, The Company will pay the optionors an annual payment in lieu of a net smelter return royalty, beginning in the year of commercial production of \$40,000 per annum. The acquisition was completed on July 8, 2024.

In addition, the Company staked six additional claims expanding the Lennac Lake project by 2,503 hectares, bringing the total project size to nine claims totaling 3,474 hectares.

On the same day, the Company closed a private placement of 6,700,000 common shares at a price of \$0.05 for total proceeds of \$335,000. The proceeds of the offering is being used for mineral exploration and general working capital purposes.

During the year ended July 31, 2024, 1,425,000 share purchase warrants expired unexercised.

On October 24, 2024, Rupert Williams resigned from his position as a director. Replacing him on the board of directors is Robert Wayne Morgan. The board of directors would like to thank Mr. Williams for all his work as a director of the Company.

On May 27, 2025, the Company received a multi-year area based drilling permit for the Lennac Lake Project from the Ministry of Mining and Critical Minerals of British Columbia.

On October 16, 2025, the Company received a loan of \$20,000 from a related party. The loan is unsecured, bears interest at 6% per annum, and is payable within one year.

Siguri Property

On April 25, 2022, the Company completed its acquisition of Sun & Sand a corporation based in Guinea, West Africa, that holds a 100% interest in the Siguri Property, a gold exploration property consisting of two contiguous blocks covering a total area of 175 square kilometres located in Siguri.

In connection with the transaction, the Company acquired all of the issued and outstanding shares of Sun & Sand. On closing, the Company issued a total of 18,142,838 common shares at a fair value of \$4,172,853. The Company incurred \$63,050 of costs related to the Transaction. Upon completion of the Transaction, Sun and Sand became a wholly owned subsidiary of the Company.

The Company has accounted for the purchase of Sun & Sand as an asset acquisition as it did not meet the definition of a business under IFRS 3, "Business Combinations". The following table summarizes the total consideration, the fair value of the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed as of the date of the acquisition:

*In November 2022, 12,742,838 of the 18,142,838 common shares issued under the Transaction have been returned to treasury for cancellation

*On May 30, 2023, the remaining 5,400,000 common shares issued under the Transaction were returned to treasury for cancellation.

The Company had issues with obtaining access to the Siguirí Gold Property to conduct the necessary exploration to maintain its license. As a result, its license was not in good standing as at September 2022. Given the current status of the license claims, the Company recognized an impairment of \$4,311,578 for the year ended July 31, 2022 and \$1 for the three months ended October 31, 2025. The Company no longer owns Sun and Sand.

Lennac Lake Property

On May 2, 2024, the Company entered a mineral property option agreement with the optioners, Donald MacIntyre and Victor Parsons ("the Optioners"). This agreement grants the Company the option to acquire a 100% interest in the Lennac Lake property, comprising three contiguous mineral claims located in the Omineca mining division of British Columbia. In order to exercise the option, the Company must make cash payments of \$100,000 to the optioners over a three-year period. The payments are scheduled as follows: \$10,000 upon signing (paid), \$20,000 by the first anniversary (paid), \$30,000 by the second anniversary and \$40,000 by the third anniversary of the agreement.

The Company is also obligated to incur exploration expenditures totaling at least \$370,000 by specific milestones: \$75,000 by the first anniversary (met), an additional \$100,000 by the second anniversary and an additional \$200,000 by the third anniversary. Upon commencement of commercial production, The Company will pay the optioners an annual payment in lieu of a net smelter return royalty, beginning in the year of commercial production of \$40,000 per annum.

In addition, the Company staked six additional claims expanding the Lennac Lake project.

At October 31, 2025, the Company has posted refundable performance bonds of \$37,700 (July 31, 2025 - \$37,700) for security of drilling activity requirements for the property.

The decreased loss for the year ended July 31, 2025 is due to the decrease in management fees, transfer agent and filing fees, and foreign exchange gain, offset by loss on settlement of debt.

The decreased loss for the year ended July 31, 2024 is due to the decrease in management fees, bank interest and investor relations, offset by the increase in office and general expenses, professional fees, transfer agent and filing fees and foreign exchange loss.

The decreased loss for the year ended July 31, 2023 is due to no impairment of Siguiiri Property, no share-based compensation, decrease in office and general expenses, transfer agent and filing fees, bank interest, and foreign exchange gain, offset by the increase in management fees and professional fees.

Results of operations

For the three months ended October 31, 2025

The comprehensive loss for the three months ended October 31, 2025 was \$19,031, which compares to a comprehensive income of \$135,663 during the same period in 2024.

Fiscal 2026

During the first quarter of fiscal 2026, the Company recorded a net loss of \$19,031 compared to a net loss of \$238,743 in the fourth quarter of fiscal 2025. The significant change is mainly due to loss on settlement of debt.

Fiscal 2025

During the fourth quarter of fiscal 2025, the Company recorded a net loss of \$238,743 compared to a net loss of \$8,349 in the third quarter of fiscal 2025. The significant change is mainly due to loss on settlement of debt.

During the third quarter of fiscal 2025, the Company recorded a net loss of \$8,349 compared to a net loss of \$37,152 in the second quarter of fiscal 2025. The significant change is mainly due to the decrease in management and professional fees and foreign exchange gain.

During the second quarter of fiscal 2025, the Company recorded a net loss of \$37,152 compared to a net income of \$135,663 in the first quarter of fiscal 2025. The significant change is mainly due to gain on settlement of debt during the first quarter.

During the first quarter of fiscal 2025, the Company recorded a net income of \$135,663 compared to a net loss of \$54,371 in the fourth quarter of fiscal 2024. The significant change is mainly due to gain on settlement of debt.

Fiscal 2024

During the fourth quarter of fiscal 2024, the Company recorded a net loss of \$54,371 compared to a net loss of \$35,151 in the third quarter of fiscal 2024. The significant change is mainly due to the increase in professional fees, transfer agent and filing fees.

During the fourth quarter of fiscal 2024, the Company recorded a net loss of \$54,371 compared to a net loss of \$35,151 in the third quarter of fiscal 2024. The significant change is mainly due to the increase in professional fees, transfer agent and filing fees.

During the third quarter of fiscal 2024, the Company recorded a net loss of \$35,151 compared to a net loss of \$95,875 in the second quarter of fiscal 2024. The significant change is mainly due to the foreign exchange gain.

Outstanding shares

As at October 31, 2025 and as at the date of the MD&A, the Company had 31,451,998 shares outstanding. As at October 31, 2025 and as at the date of the MD&A, the Company had 925,580 stock options outstanding. As at October 31, 2025 and the date of the MD&A, the Company had Nil share purchase warrants. As at October 31, 2025 and as at the date of the MD&A, the Company had a total of 32,377,578 fully diluted shares.

Liquidity and capital resources

The Company's working capital deficit at October 31, 2025 was \$536,801, compared with \$517,770 working capital deficit at July 31, 2025.

Cash used in operating activities during the three months ended October 31, 2025 totaled \$44,460 (2024 - \$28,492) which was attributed to the loss during the period of \$19,031 (2024 - income of \$135,663), interest on loans of \$49 (2024 - \$Nil), unrealized foreign exchange loss of \$Nil (2024 - \$7,106), increase in receivables of \$468 (2024 - decrease of \$5,528), decrease in prepaid expenses of \$1,250 (2024 - increase of \$3), and decrease in trade and other payables of \$26,260 (2024 - \$29,179).

Cash used in investing activities during the three months ended October 31, 2025 totaled \$Nil (2024 - \$8,634) which was attributed to the mineral property acquisition costs of \$Nil (2024 - \$11,564) and mineral property expenditures of \$Nil (2024 - \$2,930).

Cash provided in financing activities during the three months ended October 31, 2025 totaled \$20,000 (2024 - Nil) which was attributed to loans payable of \$20,000 (2024 - \$Nil).

The Company has no recent history of profitable operations. Therefore, it is subject to many risks common to comparable companies, including under-capitalization, cash shortages and limitations with respect to personnel, financial and other resources as well as a lack of adequate revenues. It will be necessary for the Company to arrange for additional financing to meet its ongoing requirements.

Management believes it will be able to raise equity capital as required in the long term, but recognizes the risks attached thereto. Although the Company has been successful in the past in obtaining financing, there can be no assurance that it will be able to obtain adequate financing in the future or that the terms of such financing may be favorable.

CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The Company manages its capital structure and makes adjustments to it, based on the funds available to the Company, in order to support the acquisition and exploration of exploration and evaluation properties. The Board of Directors does not establish quantitative return on capital criteria for management, but rather relies on the expertise of the Company's management to sustain future development of the business. The Company defines capital that it manages as share capital.

Management reviews its capital management approach on an on-going basis and believes that this approach, given the relative size of the Company, is reasonable.

The Company is in the business of exploration and evaluation and has no source of operating revenue. Operations are financed through the issuance of capital stock. Capital raised is held in cash in an interest-bearing bank account and in guaranteed investment certificates until such time as it is required to pay operating expenses or exploration and evaluation costs. The Company is not subject to any externally imposed capital restrictions. Its objectives in managing its capital are to safeguard its cash and its ability to continue as a going concern, and to utilize as much of its available capital as possible for exploration activities. The Company is not subject to any externally imposed capital requirements and the Company's objectives have not changed during the three months ended October 31, 2025.

RISK FACTORS

Companies face many and varied kinds of risks. While risk management cannot eliminate the impact of all potential risks, the Company strives to manage such risks to the extent possible and practical. Following is the risk factor most applicable to the Company.

GOING CONCERN RISK

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis under which an entity is considered to be able to realize its assets and satisfy its liabilities in the ordinary course of business. The Company's future operations are dependent upon the identification and successful completion of equity or debt or other financing and the achievement of profitable operations. There can be no assurances that the Company will be successful in achieving profitability.

The financial statements do not give effect to any adjustments relating to the carrying values and classification of assets and liabilities that would be necessary should the Company be unable to continue as a going concern.

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RELIANCE ON MANAGEMENT AND DEPENDENCE ON KEY PERSONNEL

The success of the Company will be largely dependent upon the performance of its directors and officers and the ability to attract and retain key personnel. The loss of the services of these persons may have a material adverse effect on the Company's business and prospects. The Company will compete with numerous other companies for the recruitment and retention of qualified employees and contractors. There is no assurance that the Company can maintain the service of its directors and officers or other qualified personnel required to operate its business. Failure to do so could have a material adverse effect on the Company and its prospects.

CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

Certain directors of the Company also serve as directors and/or officers of other companies involved in other business ventures. Consequently, there exists the possibility for such directors and/or officers to be in a position of conflict. Any decision made by such directors involving the Company will be made in accordance with their duties and obligations to deal fairly and in good faith with the Company and such other companies. In addition, directors involved in potential conflicts will declare, and refrain from voting on the conflicted matter.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Exploration and development projects are subject to the environmental laws and regulations of the jurisdictions within which the Company is conducting its operations. As such laws are subject to change, the Company carefully monitors proposed and potential changes, and ensures that it is and will be in strict compliance.

Various non-governmental organizations dedicated to environmental protection monitors, amongst others, the mining industry. These organizations have in the past commenced actions with the regulatory agencies or the courts to prevent or delay resource extraction activities.

TITLE TO PROPERTIES

Acquisition of title to mineral properties is a very detailed and time-consuming process. Title to, and the area of, mineral properties may be disputed. The Company cannot give an assurance that title to the properties will not be challenged or impugned. Mineral properties sometimes contain claims or transfer histories that examiners cannot verify. A successful claim that the optionors or the Company, as the case may be, does not have title to the properties could cause the Company to lose any rights to explore, develop and mine any minerals on the properties without compensation for its prior expenditures relating to the properties.

During the three months ended October 31, 2025, aggregate remuneration of \$9,000 (2024 - \$9,000) was paid or accrued to key management personnel.

As at October 31, 2025, \$384,920 (July 31, 2025 - \$382,417) is included in trade and other payables owing to current directors and officers of the Company for management fees.

On October 16, 2025, the Company entered into a loan agreement with a principal of \$20,000 from a related party. The loan interests at the rate of 6%, unsecured, and is payable within one year.

A director of the Company subscribed for 1,000,000 common shares in the private placements completed on May 17, 2024.

On August 19, 2024, the Company issued 1,583,333 common shares at fair value of \$142,498 to settle the amount of \$95,000 due to the CEO, shareholder and director of the Company. The Company recognized \$47,500 loss on the settlement in the consolidated statements of loss and comprehensive loss for the year ended July 31, 2025.

OFF-BALANCE SHEET ARRANGEMENTS

The Company has no off-balance sheet arrangements.

CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the Company's accounting policies, management is required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount and classification of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revisions affect only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods, if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following critical judgments and areas involving estimates, that management have made in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amount recognized are described in Note 4 of the Company's condensed consolidated financial statements.

INVESTOR RELATIONS ACTIVITIES

With respect to public relations, the Company's policy is to provide information from its corporate offices to investors and brokers directly.
