This Management Discussion and Analysis (this “MD&A”) provides relevant information on the operations and financial condition of New Energy Metals Corp. (the “Company”) for the period ended September 30, 2020.

The Company is in the business of mineral exploration. Activities include the evaluation, acquisition and exploration of mineral exploration properties in search of economic mineral deposits. The realization of amounts shown for exploration and evaluation assets is dependent upon the discovery of economically recoverable reserves and future profitable production or proceeds from the disposition of these assets. The carrying values of exploration and evaluation assets do not necessarily reflect their present or future values.

All monetary amounts in this MD&A and in the condensed interim consolidated financial statements are expressed in Canadian dollars, unless otherwise stated. Financial results are being reported in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (“IFRS”).

This MD&A should be read in conjunction with the Company’s condensed consolidated interim financial statements and notes thereto for the period ended September 30, 2020 and the Company’s consolidated financial statements and notes thereto for the years ended June 30, 2020 and 2019.

The Company is registered in the province of British Columbia. The Company’s head office address is Suite 2300 – 1177 West Hastings Street, Vancouver B.C. V6E 2K3. The Company’s registered and records office is 3148 Highland Boulevard, North Vancouver, B.C. V7R 2X6.

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared coronavirus COVID-19 a global pandemic. This contagious disease outbreak, which has continued to spread, and any related adverse public health developments, has adversely affected workforces, economies, and financial markets globally, potentially leading to an economic downturn. It is not possible for the Company to predict the duration or magnitude of the adverse results of the outbreak and its effects on the Company’s business or ability to raise funds.

OVERALL PERFORMANCE

The Company was incorporated on March 13, 2017 under the laws of British Columbia. On January 25, 2018, the Company completed its initial public offering (“IPO”) and upon closing of the IPO, the common shares of the Company were listed on the TSX Venture Exchange (“TSX.V”). On April 4, 2018, the Company changed its name to New Energy Metals Corp. and its trading symbol on the TSX.V to ENRG.

During the quarter ended June 30, 2020, the Company incurred management fees of \$45,000, property investigation costs of \$30,757, and general operating expenses of \$65,924.

During the quarter ended September 30, 2019, the Company incurred a loss on sale of mineral properties in the amount of \$254,321 from the disposition the Cristal Property and impairment of mineral properties in the amount of \$1,643,719.

During the quarter ended June 30, 2019, the Company incurred impairment of mineral properties in the amount of \$2,235,566.

During the quarter ended March 31, 2019, the Company incurred impairment of mineral properties in the amount of \$580,065.

Three Months ended September 30, 2020 compared to Three Months ended September 30, 2019

The Company's income and comprehensive income was \$97,607 (2019 – loss of \$1,985,741), and reviews of the major items are as follows:

- Consulting fees of \$21,000 (2019 - \$46,000) consisting of CFO fees of \$13,500 (2019 - \$13,500), Corporate Secretary fees of \$7,500 (2019 - \$7,500), and business development fees of \$Nil (2019 - \$25,000).
- Forgiveness of debt of \$194,999 (2019 - \$Nil) due to the former Chief Executive Officer of the Company agreeing to settle \$195,000 in accrued management fees in consideration of \$1.
- Impairment on exploration and evaluation assets in the amount of \$Nil (2019 - \$1,643,719) on the write-off of the multiple Chilean properties in the comparative period.
- Loss on sale of exploration and evaluation assets of \$Nil (2019 - \$254,321) related to deposition of the Cristal Property in the comparative period.
- Professional fees of \$16,204 (2019 - \$23,502) consisting of audit and tax return preparation fees of \$8,908 (2019 - \$10,042) and legal services of \$7,296 (2019 - \$13,460).
- Regulatory fees of \$2,014 (2019 - \$17,030) consisting of transfer agent fees of \$2,014 (2019 - \$3,253) and TSX.V, securities commission and other regulatory fees of \$Nil (2019 - \$13,777).

LIQUIDITY AND CAPITAL RESOURCES

Because of economic conditions, globally, there is uncertainty in capital markets and the Company anticipates that it and others in the mineral resource sector may have limited access to capital. The Company continually monitors its financing alternatives and expects to finance its fiscal 2020 operating overhead and acquisition and exploration expenditures through private placements.

The quantity of funds to be raised and the terms of any equity financing that may be undertaken will be negotiated by management as opportunities to raise funds arise. There can be no assurance that such funds will be available on favorable terms, or at all.

As at September 30, 2020, the Company reported cash of \$123,462 compared to \$101,392 as at June 30, 2020. The change in cash on hand and working capital was the result of cash provided by operating activities of \$22,070 (2019 - \$6,683), cash used in investing activities of \$Nil (2019 - \$324,756), and cash provided by financing activities of \$Nil (2019 - \$110,000).

During the period ended September 30, 2020, the Company had

- i) Net cash provided by operating activities of \$22,070 (2019 - \$6,693) consisting of the net income for the period adjusted for non-cash items
- ii) Net cash used in investing activities of \$Nil (2019 - \$324,756) consisting of cash spent on exploration and evaluation activities.
- iii) Net cash provided by financing activities of \$Nil (2019 - \$110,000). This consists of \$Nil (2019 - \$110,000) relating to the issuance of shares.

The Company has no long-term debt obligations.

Key management personnel include those persons having authority and responsibility for planning, directing and controlling the activities of the Company as a whole. The Company has determined that key management personnel consist of executive and non-executive members of the Company's Board of Directors and corporate officers. Included in accounts payable and accrued liabilities as at September 30, 2020 was \$276,617 (June 30, 2020 - \$276,617) owed to directors and officers of the Company.

During the period ended September 30, 2020, the former Chief Executive Officer of the Company agreed to settle \$195,000 in accrued management fees in consideration of \$1, which resulted in a gain of \$194,999.

RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Company's business is mineral exploration. Companies in this industry are subject to many and varied kinds of risks, including but not limited to, environmental, mineral prices, political, and economical.

The Company will take steps to verify the title to any properties in which it has an interest, in accordance with industry standards for the current stage of exploration of such properties. These procedures do not guarantee the Company's title. Property titles may be subject to unregistered prior agreements or transfers and title may be affected by undetected defects.

The Company has no significant sources of operating cash flow and no revenue from operations. Additional capital will be required to fund the Company's exploration program. The sources of funds available to the Company are the sale of equity capital or the offering of an interest in its project to another party. There is no assurance that it will be able to obtain adequate financing in the future or that such financing will be advantageous to the Company.

The property interests to be owned by the Company or in which it may acquire an option to earn an interest are in the exploration stages only, are without known bodies of commercial minerals and have no ongoing operations. Mineral exploration involves a high degree of risk and few properties, which are explored, are ultimately developed into production. If the Company's efforts do not result in any discovery of commercial minerals, the Company will be forced to look for other exploration projects or cease operations.

The Company is subject to the laws and regulations relating to environmental matters in all jurisdictions in which it operates, including provisions relating to property reclamation, discharge of hazardous materials and other matters. The Company may also be held liable should environmental problems be discovered that were caused by former owners and operators of its properties in which it previously had no interest. The Company is not aware of any existing environmental problems related to any of its current or former properties that may result in material liabilities to the Company.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND RISK MANAGEMENT

Financial risk factors

Financial instruments measured at fair value are classified into one of three levels in the fair value hierarchy according to the relative reliability of the inputs used to estimate the fair values. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are:

- Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities;
- Level 2 – Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 – Inputs that are not based on observable market data

The fair value of cash is measured at Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy. The carrying value of receivables, and accounts payable and accrued liabilities approximate their fair value because of the short-term nature of these instruments.

Financial risk factors

The Company's risk exposures and the impact on the Company's financial instruments are summarized below:

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss associated with a counterparty's inability to fulfill its payment obligations. The Company's credit risk is primarily attributable to cash and receivables. Management believes that the credit risk concentration with respect to receivables is remote as they are due from the Government of Canada. The Company's cash is deposited in accounts held at a large financial institution in Canada. As such, the Company believes the credit risk with cash is remote. Receivables comprise input tax receivables due from the Government of Canada. The Company considers the credit risk of receivables to be low.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations with financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. The Company's approach to managing liquidity risk is to ensure that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet liabilities when due. As of September 30, 2020, the Company had a cash balance of \$123,462 (June 30, 2020 - \$101,392) to settle current liabilities of \$756,535 (June 30, 2020 - \$854,624). All the Company's financial liabilities have contractual maturities of less than 30 days and are subject to normal trade terms.

The Company intends to raise additional equity financing in the coming fiscal year to meet its obligations.

Interest rate risk

The Company has cash balances and no variable interest-bearing debt. The Company's current policy is to invest excess cash in investment-grade demand investments issued by its banking institutions. The Company periodically monitors the investments it makes and is satisfied with the credit ratings of its banks. The Company is not subject to significant exposure to interest rate risk.

Foreign currency risk

The Company is exposed to foreign currency risk to the extent that monetary financial instruments are denominated in United States and Chilean currencies. The Company's operating expenses are incurred primarily in Canadian dollars; its exploration programs are primarily in Chile and are denominated in either United States dollars or Chilean pesos. The fluctuation of the Canadian dollar will, consequently, have an impact upon the reported profitability of the Company and may also affect the value of the Company's assets and liabilities. The Company continuously monitors this exposure to determine if any mitigation strategies become necessary.

The Company's sensitivity analysis suggests that a consistent 5% change in the rate of exchange in the foreign jurisdictions where it has assets employed would change foreign exchange gain or loss by approximately \$14,400 (June 30, 2020 - \$13,800).

Price risk

The Company is exposed to price risk with respect to commodity and equity prices. Equity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on the Company's profit or loss, the ability to obtain financing, or the ability to obtain a public listing due to movements in individual equity prices or general movements in the level of the stock market. Commodity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on profit or loss and economic value due to commodity price movements and volatilities. The Company closely monitors commodity prices, individual equity movements and the stock market to determine the appropriate course of action to be taken by the Company. Fluctuations in value may be significant.

CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The Company considers its capital structure to consist of all components of shareholders' deficiency, specifically its issued common shares, stock options and warrants.

The Company manages its capital structure and makes adjustments to it, based on the funds available to the Company, in order to support the acquisition, exploration and development of exploration and evaluation assets. The Board of Directors does not establish quantitative return on capital criteria for management, but rather relies on the expertise of the Company's management to sustain future development of the business.

The properties in which the Company currently has an interest are in the exploration stage; as such the Company has historically relied on the equity markets to fund its activities. The Company will continue to assess new properties and seek to acquire an interest in additional properties if it feels there is sufficient economic potential and if it has adequate financial resources to do so.

Management reviews its capital management approach on an ongoing basis and believes that this approach, given the relative size of the Company, is reasonable. The Company is not subject to externally imposed capital restrictions. There were no changes to the Company's approach to capital management during the period.
