



Management's Discussion & Analysis
For the year ended August 31, 2021

The following Management's Discussion and Analysis ("MD&A") of Baru Gold Corp., (the "Company" or "Baru") should be read in conjunction with the audited consolidated financial statements for the year ended August 31, 2021 and related notes attached thereto, which have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS"). This MD&A contains "forward-looking statements" that are subject to risk factors set out in a cautionary note contained herein. Except as otherwise disclosed, all dollar figures in this report are stated in Canadian dollars ("CAD"). The effective date of this report is December 23, 2021.

Company Overview

Baru is an Indonesian-based Canadian mineral exploration company and trades on the TSX Venture Exchange under the symbol "BARU". Baru Gold Corporation is building a new gold production facility in Indonesia; the Company is a dynamic junior gold developer with NI43-101 gold resources in Indonesia, one of the top 10 gold producer countries in the world. In 2020, Baru Gold reached milestones including, the receipt of the environmental permit (known as the "AMDAL"), and paid the outstanding mining asset tax, colloquially referred to as "dead-rent tax", on its Sangihe Gold project. During the year ended August 31, 2021, the Company's licence was upgraded to 'Operation Production License' to advance the project to construction and production in 2022.

Our team of mining and finance professionals are based both in North America and locally in Indonesia and boast extensive experience in starting and operating small-scale gold and coal assets. With sufficient cash and strong retail and institutional shareholders support, Baru Gold is well positioned to take advantage of the increased interest in gold and precious metals with both exploration upsides and operation cashflow in 2022.

The significant events during the year ended August 31, 2021 and to the date of this report are as follows:

- The Company changed its name to "Baru Gold Corp" from "East Asia Minerals Corporation".
- The Company paid the outstanding "dead-rent tax" on the Sangihe gold project of approximately \$356,000 (approximately Indonesian Rupiah 3.8 billion). The tax was paid to the representative office of the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources. This payment brings the Company's financial obligations to regulators for the project current. The Operation Production License is now the only remaining government administrative item outstanding before the project can advance to construction and operations.
- The Company received the AMDAL environmental permit for the Sangihe gold project.
- The Company applied for and received the upgrade of the Sangihe gold project's Contract of Work ("CoW") to a full production and export licence. Baru's subsidiary, PT. Tambang Mas Sangihe or "TMS" (the holder of the Sangihe CoW) submitted the application to the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources of North Sulawesi, Indonesia. The Company's detailed works program and business plan ("DWP" and "BP" respectively) were approved by the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources at an open meeting attended by TMS and representatives of both Provincial and Central mines departments. To complete the license upgrade on the Sangihe project, to Operation Production status, the company needed to receive final approval from the Minister of Energy and Mineral Resources. The license upgrade enables Baru to begin construction of the gold production facilities and infrastructure for the Sangihe project.
- The Company closed a private placement of \$4,400,000 through the issuance of 29,333,331 units priced at \$0.15 per unit. Each unit consists of one common share and one common share purchase warrant in the capital of the Company. Each warrant shall be exercisable into one share at an exercise price of \$0.25 for three years from the date of issuance.
- The Company's work plan and budget (Rencana Kerja Anggaran Belanja (RKAB)) for PT Tambang Mas Sangihe (TMS) for 2021 was formally approved by the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources. The RKAB includes planning and proposed expenditures for construction, mining, production, community programs, environmental rehabilitation, and geological and geotechnical investigations for 2021. The RKAB is a formal annual requirement for all mining concessions in Indonesia, whether in the exploration or production phase, and the approval is a prerequisite to any activities being carried out in that particular year.

- The Company updated the stakeholders on the progress made by Martin Jati Lawyers on the land acquisition process previously announced August 22, 2020. The land acquisition survey has allowed the Baru team to identify the area of interest around the Sangihe gold project based on recommendations and analysis from Baru chief operation officer Garry Kielenstyn and chief geologist Frank Rocca in Indonesia. The land acquisition team of Martin Jati has commenced with the land acquisition of the phase one mining area based on the results from the survey in Q1 2021.
- The Company began trading on the OTCQB Venture Market under the ticker symbol BARUF.
- The Company's management engineering team has mobilized to the project site on Sangihe Island, Indonesia. Mr. Garry Kielenstyn, COO Sangihe Gold Project and Mr Fatchil Amal, Mine Technical Manager join the balance of the core team already on the island. In the near-term, the team will focus on office and site setup, hiring of construction personnel and procurement of construction materials and equipment in preparation for the construction of the heap leach operation at the Sangihe gold project site.
- Appointed Mr. Joseph Keane to the Company's Board of Directors.
- The Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources (MEMR) upgraded its Sangihe Gold Project Contract of Work ("CoW") to Operation Production status after a three month delay due to the Covid-19 pandemic in Indonesia.
- The Company approved a new shareholder rights plan pursuant to a shareholder rights agreement between the Company and Computer Trust Company of Canada as rights agent.
- Appointed Mr. John J. Ellis to the Company's Board of Directors.
- Approved the 2021 annual budget which includes a 35,000-metre Resource Development drilling program targeted to start in mid-2021 and run for 13 months until completion.
- The Company reported on its Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) efforts to improve the community on Sangihe Island where the Company's gold project is located. The Company is in the early stages of implementing its CSR programs and has identified eight key community development directives.
- The Company amended the exercise term of 1,172,500 outstanding common share purchase warrants issued on May 8, 2019 from May 8, 2021 to June 8, 2021 and 3,928,000 outstanding share purchase warrants issued on June 17, 2019 from June 17, 2021 to October 17, 2021.
- The Company issued 1,170,750 stock options to officers, directors, employees and consultants at an exercise price of \$0.07 for a period of 5 years.
- Appointed Mr. Colin James Davies to the Company's Board of Directors.
- The Company issued 10.02 million units in the first tranche and 6.74 million units in the second tranche, for total proceeds of \$1,676,000. The private placement (the "Private Placement") consists of up to 16,760,000 units priced at \$0.10 per unit (the "Unit"). Each Unit is comprised of one common share in the capital of the Company (a "Share") and one-half common share purchase warrant (a "Warrant"). Each full Warrant shall be exercisable into one Share at an exercise price of \$0.17 for 2 years from the date such Warrant is issued.

Exploration and Evaluation Assets

Sangihe Project

The Sangihe Gold project is located on the island of Sangihe off the northern coast of Sulawesi in Indonesia and has an existing National Instrument 43-101 inferred mineral resource of 114,700 indicated and 105,000 inferred ounces of gold as reported in the Company's "Independent Technical Report on the Mineral Resource Estimates of the Binebase and Bawone Deposits, Sangihe Project, North Sulawesi, Indonesia" dated May 30, 2017. The complete NI 43-101 Resource Estimate can be accessed on the SEDAR website at www.sedar.com.

Only 10% of the gold bearing area has been explored. Readers are cautioned that mineral resources that are not mineral reserves do not have demonstrated economic viability. The Company's 70-percent interest in the Sangihe-mineral-tenement contract of work ("CoW") is held through PT. Tambang Mas Sangihe (TMS). The remaining 30-percent interest in TMS is held by three Indonesian corporations. The term of the Sangihe CoW agreement is for 30 years upon commencement of the production phase of the project.

The Company has agreed to fund 100% of the exploration and development and operating expenditures of the exploration and evaluation assets up to and including the costs of any feasibility studies, after which all parties are to fund their proportionate share, or have their interest diluted.

During the year ended August 31, 2021, the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources (MEMR) upgraded its Sangihe Gold Project Contract of Work ("CoW") to Operation Production status. The Company also announced a 25,000-metre drilling program that has commenced in December 2021, with the arrival of the drilling rig on the island.

The initial area targeted for this drilling program is covered in the Sangihe 2010 NI 43-101 report which identified 835,000 ounces of gold as an inferred resource between Binebase and Bawone villages over approximately 1.2 kilometres of strike length. An infill drilling program will be conducted in this area to upgrade some of the inferred resources into indicated and measured resource status. The Company has prepared 27 drill pad sites which will be the focus of activity over the first quarter of 2022.

Thereafter, exploration drilling will continue over an additional 1.45 kilometres from Bawone to South of Salurang village following the continuation of the known geochemical anomaly and with additional guidance from the ongoing structural study. Once that program has been completed, the identified resources will then be infill drilled to bring some of these resources into indicated and measured status. The drilling rig will then be further deployed for targeted work in the region.

Clearing of land and construction of access roads has commenced in preparation for the building of two 100,000 tonnes heap leach pads, pit overburden removal, preparation of waste dumps, a crushing facility, and a processing plant area. Land Acquisition is on-going and has minimal effect on construction.

The Company intends to proceed to production without the benefit of first establishing mineral reserves supported by a feasibility study. The Company cautions readers that the any production decision made by the Company will not be based on a NI 43-101 feasibility study of mineral reserves that demonstrates economic and technical viability and as such, there may be involved increased uncertainty and various technological and economic risks such as the interpretation of drill results; the geology, grade and continuity of mineral deposits; the possibility that future exploration, development or mining results will not be consistent with our expectations; commodity and currency price fluctuation; failure to obtain adequate financing; regulatory, recovery rates, refinery costs, and other relevant conversion factors, permitting and licensing risks; general market and mining exploration risks and production and economic risks related to design and engineering, manufacturing, technological processes and test procedures and the risk that the project's output will not be salable at a price that will cover the project's operating and maintenance costs.

Miwah Project

Miwah is located at the northern tip of Sumatra Island in Aceh Province within the Sumatran fault system. Indonesia is also home to billion dollar deposits such as Martabe (UT-Pama Group), Tujuh Bukit (Merdeka Copper & Gold) and Grasberg (Inalum-Freeport).

Project has exploration upside potential. The Company has invested \$60 million on exploration with over 20,000 meters drilled. The company ceased the drilling program in 2015 due to a forest moratorium implemented by the previous government and lack of capital.

In furtherance of its efforts on the Miwah project, in 2019, the Company has held various meetings with federal and regional government officials discussing the process required to bring the Miwah Project current and in compliance with both local and federal authorities. These efforts have been on hold since 2020 due to the pandemic conditions around the world.

The significant events giving rise to the fluctuations in the quarters are as follows:

- During the three months ended February 28, 2021, the Company recorded share-based payments of \$2,126,876.
- During the three months ended August 31, 2020, the Company recorded a loss on extinguishment of debt of \$679,959.
- During the three months ended May 31, 2020, the Company recorded a loss on extinguishment of debt of \$135,849 and wrote-off of accounts payable of \$506,544.
- During the three months ended August 31, 2019, the Company recorded a foreign exchange loss of \$85,008 and a gain on extinguishment of debt of \$86,865.

Results of Operations

The Company recorded a consolidated net loss of \$4,069,939 (\$0.02 per common share) for the year ended August 31, 2021 as compared to a consolidated net loss of \$1,925,825 (\$0.02 per common share) for the year ended August 31, 2020.

Year ended August 31, 2021

Operating expenses were \$4,084,320 for the year ended August 31, 2021 as compared to \$1,375,323 for the year ended August 31, 2020.

Expense details are as follows:

- Foreign exchange loss of \$57,455 (2020 – gain of \$24,683) – the variance is due to fluctuations in the foreign exchange rates in the current period and previous period.
- Investor relations of \$280,516 (2020 - \$70,764) – during the current period the Company undertook a marketing program to raise the Company's profile.
- Share-based payments of \$2,302,721 (2020 - \$128,909) – during the current period the Company issued 14,995,750 stock options (2020 – 2,500,000) using the Black Scholes Pricing Model.

During the year ended August 31, 2021, the Company recorded a loss on extinguishment of debt of \$nil (2020 – \$828,764) and a gain on extinguishment of accounts payable of \$14,381 (2020 - \$278,262).

Three months ended August 31, 2021

Operating expenses were \$770,727 for the three months ended August 31, 2021 as compared to \$430,433 for the three months ended August 31, 2020.

Expense details are as follows:

- Foreign exchange loss of \$43,407 (2020 – gain of \$58,846) – the variance is due to fluctuations in the foreign exchange rates in the current period and previous period.
- Investor relations of \$13,700 (2020 - \$23,864) – during the current period the Company continued the marketing program to raise the Company's profile.
- Management fees of \$292,956 (2020 - \$74,826) – management fees were higher during the current period due to increased activities on the Sangihe project.

During the three months ended August 31, 2021, the Company recorded a loss on extinguishment of debt of \$nil (2020 – \$679,959) and a loss on extinguishment of accounts payable of \$163 (2020 – \$288,282).

Liquidity & Capital Resources

The Company's aggregate operating, investing and financing activities during the year ended August 31, 2021 resulted in a net increase of \$1,366,479 in its cash balance of \$566,380 at August 31, 2020, to \$1,932,859 at August 31, 2021. The Company's working capital was \$1,081,194 at August 31, 2021 (2020 – deficiency of \$2,076,255).

The Company's operations for the year ended August 31, 2021 used \$3,224,291 (2020 - \$230,809) of cash, \$1,593,572 (2020 - \$606,638) of cash was used in investing activities and \$6,184,342 (2020 - \$1,341,999) of cash was received from financing activities.

During the year ended August 31, 2021, the company's investing activities of \$1,593,572 (2020 - \$606,638) were for exploration and evaluation assets.

During the year ended August 31, 2021, the cash provided by financing activities was \$6,184,342 (2020 - \$1,341,999) which was mainly made up of \$4,400,000 (2020 - \$1,184,884) from private placements, \$1,982,056 (2020 - \$nil) from the exercise of

warrants, \$63,725 (2020 - \$nil) from the exercise of stock options, loan proceeds of \$nil (2020 - \$203,411), loan repayments of \$172,953 (2020 - \$9,200) and lease payments of \$30,654 (2020 - \$30,939).

Financial instruments

IFRS 7, *Financial Instruments: Disclosures*, establishes a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

- Level 1 - quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities;
- Level 2 - inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices); and
- Level 3 - inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

Cash and cash equivalents are classified as Level 1 in the fair value hierarchy.

As of August 31, 2021, the carrying values of cash and cash equivalents, receivables, accounts payable, accrued liabilities, loan payable, and due to related parties, approximate their fair values due to their short term to maturity.

Financial Risks

The Company has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments:

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of potential loss to the Company if the counter party to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Company's credit risk is primarily attributable to its cash and cash equivalents and receivables. The Company limits exposure to credit risk by maintaining its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. Substantially all of the Company's cash and cash equivalents are held with a major Canadian financial institution. A significant portion of receivables is due from the Government of Canada for sales tax refunds. Management believes that the credit risk concentration with respect to cash and cash equivalents and receivables is minimal.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Company has a planning and budgeting process in place to help determine the funds required to support the Company's normal operating requirements on an ongoing basis. The Company ensures that there are sufficient funds to meet its short-term business requirements, taking into account its anticipated cash flows from operations and its holdings of cash.

As of August 31, 2021, the Company had cash and cash equivalents of \$1,932,859 (2020 - \$566,380) to settle current liabilities of \$1,426,188 (2020 - \$2,754,576).

Historically, the Company's sole source of funding has been the issuance of equity securities for cash, primarily through private placements. The Company's access to financing is uncertain. There can be no assurance of continued access to significant equity funding.

Interest and foreign exchange risk

The Company is subject to normal risks including fluctuations in foreign exchange rates and interest rates. While the Company manages its operations in order to minimize exposure to these risks, it has not entered into any derivatives or contracts to hedge or otherwise mitigate this exposure. At August 31, 2021, the Company was not exposed to significant interest rate risk.

Certain of the Company's operating expenditures are denominated in United States Dollars ("USD") and Indonesian Rupiah ("IDR"). The Company's exposure to exchange rate fluctuations arises mainly on foreign currencies against the Canadian dollar functional currency of the relevant business entities. The Company is principally engaged in the exploration and development of mineral properties in Indonesia.

Sensitivity analysis

The Company is exposed to foreign currency risk on fluctuations related to cash and cash equivalents, receivables and accounts payable and accrued liabilities that are denominated in USD. As of August 31, 2021, net financial liabilities totaling \$117,654 (2020 – \$259,995) were held in USD and net financial liabilities totaling \$982,645 (2020 – \$1,050,607) were held in IDR.

Based on the above net exposure as of August 31, 2021 and assuming all other variables remain constant, a 1% depreciation or appreciation of the USD against the Canadian dollar would result in an increase or decrease of approximately \$1,177 (2020 - \$2,600) in the Company's loss and comprehensive loss. A 1% depreciation or appreciation of the IDR against the Canadian dollar would result in an increase or decrease of approximately \$9,826 (2020 - \$10,500) in the Company's loss and comprehensive loss.

Capital Management

The Company considers the items in shareholders' equity as capital. The Company manages and adjusts its capital structure based on available funds to support the acquisition and exploration of its exploration and evaluation assets. The Board of Directors does not establish quantitative return on capital criteria for management, but rather relies on the expertise of the Company's management to sustain future development of the business.

The properties in which the Company currently has an interest are in the exploration and evaluation stage; and as such the Company is dependent on external financing to fund its activities. To carry out planned exploration and development, and pay for administrative costs, the Company will spend its existing working capital and raise additional amounts as needed. The Company will continue to assess new properties and seek to acquire an interest in additional properties if it believes there is sufficient geological or economic potential and if it has adequate financial resources to do so.

Management reviews its capital management approach on an ongoing basis and believes that this approach, given the relative size of the Company, is reasonable.

There were no changes in the Company's approach to capital management during the year ended August 31, 2021. The Company is not subject to externally imposed capital requirements.

Off-Balance Sheet Arrangements

The Company has no off-balance sheet arrangements.

Proposed Transactions

The Company is not contemplating any other transactions which have not already been disclosed.

Going Concern

The Company's exploration and evaluation assets are in Indonesia and are subject to certain regulatory and forestry permitting issues. The Company also has not yet determined whether its exploration and evaluation assets contain ore reserves that are economically recoverable. The recoverability of the amounts shown for exploration and evaluation assets are dependent upon the existence of economically recoverable reserves, the ability of the Company to obtain necessary permits to explore, develop and achieve future profitable production activity from its exploration and evaluation assets or, alternatively, upon the Company's ability to dispose of its interest on an advantageous basis.

To date, from the currently held exploration and evaluation assets, the Company has not generated any significant revenues and has a significant aggregate operating deficit. The continuing operations of the Company are dependent upon its ability to raise adequate financing. Management is also aware that material uncertainties exist related to current economic conditions, which could cast doubt about the entity's ability to continue to finance its activities. As a result, the Company will need to seek additional equity financing as there are insufficient cash reserves to continue operations and planned exploration.

Although management uses historical experience and its best knowledge of the amount, events or actions to form the basis for judgments and estimates, actual results may vary from these estimates.
